## Local Organization Sparks Global Action

Since 2004, the San Francisco-based organization Spark has been helping young professionals — who range in age from 25 to 45 years old — ignite their interest and dedication to the plight of women and girls around the world, while building a community of people who do are interested in doing good works.

President and co-founder Kathleen Kelly believes that Spark is the perfect opportunity for busy, young professionals to become involved in worthy causes. Because many young professionals are busy building their careers and lives, Spark allows members to be engaged in philanthropic work than can easily fit into their hectic schedules — an opportunity that Kelly said has been difficult for many of them to find.

"A lot of us were coming out of school and starting to work in the professional world, realizing that there weren't a lot of opportunities for young people to be engaged in meaningful ways," she said.

"We founded Spark as a way to engage young professionals in global women's issues and to really create community around the idea of giving back through philanthropy. It really gives young people an option to be able to have handson volunteering opportunities for our grantees here, and to collaborate in a lot of different, more unique ways."

Among some of the causes that Spark has been involved with include the Campaign for Female Education, a group that is dedicated to sending African girls to school; Girls on the Run, which supports athletic training programs for young girls; Oasis for Girls, which provides tutoring for

underprivileged students; and Circulo de Vida, which supparts Bay Area women living with breast cancer.

Spark chooses its grantees based on the stories of human drama behind them. Kelly said that when a story has both local and global ramifications, and expresses the importance of female empowerment, it is a good example of cause that Spark is interested in putting its support behind.
